

Virginia Brain Injury Fact Sheet


A Public Policy Guide

- In 2019, there were 5,248 traumatic brain injury (TBI) related hospitalizations and 1,669 deaths¹.
- 3,263 individuals received community based services from state funded providers in 2021.
- Over 302,000 Virginians are disabled as a result of TBI and stroke²⁻³.
- Current state funding to provide community based services is \$6.75 million (\$6 per person).

State-Funded Programs


There are 9 community based programs serving persons with moderate to severe brain injury in Virginia; they are funded through a line-item appropriation in the state budget.

Resource Coordination

Provides outreach to people recently hospitalized in Virginia for brain injury; information and referral, consultation and technical assistance services to persons with brain injury, family caregivers and professionals. The Brain Injury Association of Virginia is the sole provider, and covers the entire state.


