- Supported Living Program Clients live in their own apartments with maximum of 10 hours of supervision/assistance provided weekly. Client must have or find something productive to do during day.
- Montgomery House houses up to 4 men. It is an independent living home for those who are, or at risk of, being homeless. Cost is \$450/month. It offers some support for household maintenance etc. and a biweekly house meeting. House facilitator is on-site once a week. Individuals must have a place to go each day.

Residents need to be able to participate in their own care, learn independent living skills, be drug and alcohol free and have some involvement in a daily productive activity (e.g., work, clubhouse, etc). Candidates cannot require more than six hours of personal care assistance daily, have no or little behavioral issues and meet income eligibility requirements.

Serves adults, ages 18 and up. Tree of Life Services provides community based transitional and long-term assisted living services for persons with acquired brain injury. The program is medically directed and supervised by Nathan D. Zasler, MD. A comprehensive, transdisciplinary therapy staff including neuropsychology and behavioral therapies provide individualized treatment in a setting that can provide 24 hour supervision, care and access to medical and neuropsychological/behavioral services including recreational and vocational activities

(Not exclusively for people with brain injuries, however, some residents do have brain injuries.)

Provides residential treatment for adults (over 18) includes intensive neurobehavioral treatment, comprehensive rehabilitation, a transitional unit and supported living services. Neurobehavioral Program provides 24 hour awake supervision and on-site nursing; consultation as needed from neuropsychologist, behavior analyst, and psychiatrist; and a rehabilitation team of PT, OT, Speech, Clinical Social Work, Case Management. Recreation, skill development groups, fitness activities, vocational activities, supported employment, substance abuse services and community integration helps participants advance to a more independent setting.

## Community Based Services - Statewide

Many people with brain injury are able to live in the community of their choice if they have access to services that support them in their home – or that of a family member. Medicaid Waivers provide funding for supports people with brain injury who meet financial and functional criteria. The **CCC** + **Waiver** provides Personal care, Respite Care, Adult Day Health Care, Emergency Response Systems, Assistive Technology and Environmental Modification. People who sustained their injury before age 22, can be screened for one of the **Developmental Disabilities Waivers (DD Waiver).** It provides a wider range of services but has a long waiting list (see <a href="http://www.mylifemycommunityvirginia.org/">http://www.mylifemycommunityvirginia.org/</a>).
